

Barbecue †	from an Arawakan language of Haiti <i>barbakoa</i> , "framework of sticks".
Canoe †	from Taino via Spanish <i>canoa</i> .
Caribou †	From Míkmaq <i>qalipu</i> , "snow-shoveler".
Chipmunk †	Originally "chitmunk," " red squirrel ".
Eskimo †	From Old Montagnais <aiachkimeou> (/a:jastʃime:w/) (modernayassimēw), meaning "snowshoe-netter".
Guava †	from an Arawakan language.
Hammock †	from Taino , via Spanish <i>hamaca</i> .
Hurricane †	from Taino <i>hurakán</i> , via Spanish .
Husky †	Ultimately from a variant form of the word "Eskimo".
Iguana †	from an Arawakan language <i>iwana</i> .
Maize †	from Taino <i>mahís</i> , by way of Spanish.
Mangrove †	from Taino , via Spanish <i>mangle</i> or Portuguese <i>mangue</i> .
Moccasin †	From an Algonquian language, perhaps Powhatan <mockasin>, reconstituted as */mahkesen/).
Moose †	From Eastern Abenaki <i>moz</i> .
Opossum †	From Powhatan <apasum>/<opossum>/<aposoum>, "white dog-like animal".
Papaya †	from Taino .
Pecan †	From Illinois <i>pakani</i> (c.f. Ojibwe <i>bagaan</i>), "nut".
Persimmon †	From Powhatan <pessemmins>/<pushemins>.
Potato †	from the Taino word for "sweet potato", via Spanish <i>batata</i> .
Savanna †	from Taino <i>zabana</i> , via Spanish .
Skunk †	From Massachusetts <squnck> (Proto-Algonquian *šeka·kwa, from *šek-, "to urinate" + *-a·kw, "fox").
Squash (fruit) †	From Narragansett <askútasquash>.
Tobacco †	probably from an Arawakan language, via Spanish : <i>tabaco</i> .
Tomahawk †	From Powhatan <tamahaac> (Proto-Algonquian *temaha·kani, from *temah-, "to cut" + *-a·kan, "instrument for").
Totem †	From Ojibwe <i>nindoodem</i> , "my totem" or <i>odoodeeman</i> , "his totem," referring to a kin group .
Wigwam †	From Eastern Abenaki <i>wikewam</i> , from Proto-Algonquian *wi·kiwa·Hmi.
